





Formation of the Vector Borne Disease Network – May 2019

- Created an avenue for greater/efficient communication amongst governmental, professional and trade organizations to share information related to VBD's.
- 23 Founding members including the AMCA, GMCA, ESA, SOVE, FMEL, National Environmental Health Association (NEHA), National Association of County and City Officials (NACCHO), National Pest Management Association (NPMA)
- Shared legislative messages in Washington D.C.

What's New at the National Level in L&R

- In mid-September, 2018 the US. Fish and Wildlife Service issued/published their long-awaited final draft of their "Handbook for Mosquito Management on National Wildlife Refuges," a 44 page guidance document for Refuge Managers concerning mosquito control needs and practices on-refuge.
 Only took 21 years. Some of the key parts:
 - "Mosquitoes are part of the ecosystem protected by the NWR system"
 - Unless mosquitoes interfere with refuge-specific management goals and objectives, or cause a public or wildlife health risk, they are allowed to exist unimpeded on a refuge
 - Heavy reliance of disease surveillance mosquito control allowed for only for disease suppression
 - Probably not much MC activity allowed for nuisance suppression and/or human QOL
 - Mosquito adulticides are not recommended on NWR
 - Appears that local Refuge managers will make the final call here in establishing Mosquito Management Plans

What's New at the National Level in L&R

- NPDES legislation: After 20 years of putting up the "good-fight" with Congress and lobbyists, the AMCA had decided to no longer spend our limited resources in this debate.
- SMASH Act "Strengthening Mosquito Abatement for Safety and Health Act" \$130m appropriated to Zika virus and other mosquito-borne diseases preparedness and response efforts (2018-2023). <u>Funding</u> <u>directly to the local MCD's</u>. Already passed the House and Senate. Waiting on appropriations. Similar bill was passed in 2003. Never appropriated.
- AMCA and USDA trying to iron out the regulatory language relating to mosquito control near/over organic farms
- AMCA members participated in an EPA Roundtable discussion on Malathion use patterns as part of the data-gather process for re-registration (May 2019)
- AMCA continues to be involved in dialogue with the USFWS in the use patterns of mosquito control chemistries and how these products may (or may not) interact with endangered species (notably 4 spp of bees)
- Currently the Board recently hired AMG to manage the AMCA business replacing AH who had served this role since 2006
- The Board is currently seeking applications for a Technical Advisor


